### August 2018

No Flooding occurred during the month of August.

The biggest story for the month was that the Meteorological Summer of 2018(June-August) was the warmest on record. The Summer of 2018 had an average temperature of 66.3 degrees, which eclipsed the previous record of 66.0 degrees set during the Summer of 1973. August 2018 was the all-time warmest on record at Caribou with an average temperature of 68.9 degrees. This was 5.3 degrees above average(1981-2010 averages). It broke the previous record warm August in 2015, when the average temperature was 68.2 degrees. Temperatures across the region for the month of August ranged from 3 to 7degrees above normal. Caribou had a total of 18 days in the month of August with a high temperature of 80 degrees or warmer. Bangor had a monthly average temperature of 71.3 degrees. This was 4.3 degrees above normal. Bangor recorded their warmest temperature for the month back on August 7<sup>th</sup> with 95 degrees.

In regards to precipitation, rainfall for the most part was below normal for the month of August with the exception for Millinocket, which recorded 4.03 inches of rainfall. This was 0.09 inches above normal for August. Caribou recorded 3.87 inches of rainfall, which was 0.11 inches above normal for the month of August. The St. John Valley and the Allagash region recorded very low rainfall for the month of August. Frenchville recorded 1.92 inches of rainfall, which was 1.09 inches below normal for the month.

Overall, ground water conditions were near normal with the exception for NW Maine and a few sites across the Maine Central Highlands, as surface water conditions were below normal.

Streamflows continued improved to near normal across a good portion of the region. The exception to this was along the East Branch of the Penobscot River at Grindstone with streamflows much below normal.

As far as conditions approaching near Drought conditions, the USDM raised the category across the Hancock County coast to Moderate Drought(D1). Northern Maine remained in the Abnormally Dry category (D0).




