### **June 2020**

Some minor flooding occurred during the month of June. Mainly culverts and ditches filling up with ponding of water in the streets of Bangor in southern Penobscot County due to heavy rain from thunderstorms. This occurred on June 26<sup>th</sup>. An Urban and Small Stream Advisory was issued for that event.

The month of June started out quite cool and then transitioned to a very hot second half of the month with the month finishing out much above normal. Temperatures for the month of June came in 1 to 2 degrees above normal across the Downeast region, while Northern Maine was 4 degrees above normal. The first half of the month came in with below normal temperatures, but finished well above normal after the 15<sup>th</sup> with a major heat wave similar to what took place in May. Near all-time record June heat occurred from the 18th through the 20th and continued with above normal temperatures for the remainder of the month. Caribou had a monthly average temperature of 64.4 degrees which exceeded the prior record warm June of 64 degrees recorded in 2006 and 1976. Houlton recorded an average monthly temperature of 62.8 degree and Millinocket came in with a monthly average temperature of 65.2 degrees which was the 8<sup>th</sup> warmest June on record for both sites. Bangor recorded a monthly average temperature of 65.2 degrees. After recording a low temperature of 31 degrees on the 2<sup>nd</sup>, temperatures soared to daily record highs of 95 degrees on the 18th, and 96 degrees on the 19th. The record high temperature of 96 degrees on the 19th tied the all-time high that was set back on May 22nd, 1977. There was also a total of 14 days with a high temperature of 80 degrees or warmer, which was most on record for June. The previous record was 13 set in 1976. There were 4 days with high temperature of 90 degrees or warmer. In Houlton, a new record low for the month of 26 degrees occurred on the 2<sup>nd</sup>. Houlton had high temperatures of 93, 95 and 94 degrees covering a 3 day stretch from the 18<sup>th</sup> to the 20<sup>th</sup>. There were a total of 14 days with a high of 80 degrees or warmer. Houlton had a total of 3 days with 90 degrees. A few sites did reach around 100 degrees in June. These sites were non-climate sites. The towns of Etna and Mattawamkeag recorded 101 degrees on the 20<sup>th</sup> and Shin Pond recorded 100 degrees on the same day. The last time any of the climate sites reached 100 degrees was back on August 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> of 1975, when Millinocket reached 100 degrees and Bangor recorded 102 degrees

Precipitation was well below normal across the region. The biggest deficits were across Northern Maine. Caribou recorded only 0.88 inches of precipitation, which was 2.60 inches below normal. This tied the driest June on record in Caribou, which was last set in 1983. Houlton came in with only 1.18 inches, which was 2.47 inches below normal. Frenchville, in NW Maine, recoded only 1.16 inches, which was 2.69 inches below normal. Bangor came in with 2.08 inches. This was 1.68 inches below normal.

Streamflows across the HSA were much below normal for June. Some river gages such as Nine Mile Bridge on the St. John and Dover-Foxcroft on the Piscataquis recorded near Record Low flows. Nine Mile Bridge saw its daily stage drop below a foot toward the end of the month due to the heat and dry conditions.

Groundwater levels did drop during the month of June, especially across the northern and central areas, where some wells recorded below normal ground water levels. Clayton Lake in NW Aroostook County came in w/much below normal groundwater levels. Kenduskeag in S Penobscot County recorded below normal levels. Groundwater levels across the Downeast region and toward the coast remained near normal.

In regards to Drought monitoring, the HSA saw conditions hit the Abnormally Dry to Moderate Drought category. Northern Maine saw the driest conditions, especially Aroostook County. Evaporation measurements taken at Caribou showed a monthly evaporation of 5.29 inches for the month.




