August 2020

Some minor flooding occurred during the month of August. A complex of thunderstorms moved across the region on the 25th. Some minor flooding occurred in Presque Isle with storm drains spilling over onto some streets. A Flood Advisory for Urban and Small Streams was issued for that event.

The very warm summer continued with the month of August coming in above normal with temperatures averaging from 1.5 to 3 degrees above normal. It was the second warmest July on record for Caribou, with July 2018 being the warmest. In Caribou, August ranked as the 8th warmest on record. In Houlton, August ranked as the 12th warmest on record. Interestingly enough, neither Bangor nor Millinocket ranked in the top 20 for the warmest August on record.

Rainfall for the most part was below normal. Caribou came in with 2.24 inches for August, which was 1.52 inches below normal. Houlton came in with only 1.47 inches, which was 2.24 inches below normal. However, there were some sites such areas such as the western St. John Valley, the Bangor and coastal Washington County saw rainfall above normal. Bangor recorded 4.21 inches of precipitation, which was 0.75 inches above normal. There were two rain events in August. A complex of storms brought some heavy rain to portions of the region with portions of the Maine Central Highlands and the Downesat region receiving the heaviest rainfall. Bangor recorded a daily precipitation record of 1.74 inches on August 18th, which broke the previous record of 1.32 inches set in 1958. Millinocket recorded 1.09 inches of rain on the same day. The other event was on the 29th and 30th w/the region seeing 0.75 to 1.25 inches of rainfall. Some sites along the Washington County coast received up to 2.00 inches of rain.

Streamflows across the region for the most part were much below normal for August. A number of river gages continued to record near Record Low flows. Streamflows however did climb to normal flows for the Nine Mile Bridge on the St. John River.

Groundwater levels fluctuated some during the month of August, once again thanks to some needed rainfall. Some wells remained much below normal across portions of the Maine Central Highlands, Northern Maine and Downeast Maine including the coast. Interestingly enough, Calais and Fort Kent

came in with normal Groundwater levels due to some needed rain. Clayton Lake in NW Aroostook County dropped to low levels.

In regards to Drought monitoring, the region saw conditions worsen to Moderate Drought(D1) across just about the entire region by the end of the month, with the exception of Northern and Central Aroostook County as the category held at Severe Drought(D2) through the first two weeks of August. By the end of the month, Severe Drought(D2) conditions extended into northern Penobscot and Piscataquis County and all of the eastern 3rd of the region, with the rest of the region holding in Moderate Drought(D1)




